The most popular methods for dye removal are biological (adsorption by biomass, algae degradation, aerobic-anaerobic treatment, enzyme degradation, etc.), chemical (advanced oxidation process, electrochemical destruction, oxidation, ozonation, photochemical, and ultraviolet irradiation), and physical (adsorption, coagulation, flocculation, ion exchange, irradiation, membrane filtration, nano-filtration or ultra-filtration and reverse osmosis) and various combinations of the three.

The Special Issue will publish experimental and review papers, as well as short communications, discussing recent developments in the field of dye wastewater treatment and purification of aqueous solutions using biological, chemical, and physical methods.
